April 25, 2017 Council Public Hearing

June 1, 2017 Council adopts final budget

STABILITY AND RESPONSIBILITY (FY 14-15)

- Took steps necessary to stabilize the budget
- Solved \$30 million operating deficit
- Critical shortage of cash
- Staring at bankruptcy
- Cancelled \$20 million in existing debt authorizations
- Worked with unions to discuss future savings in high deductible healthcare plans



INVESTING IN A STRONGER TOMORROW (FY 15-16)

- First year with a significant surplus
- First year with Grand List growth
- First bond upgrade
- Focused on debt restructuring
- Initiated 3 year forecasting model for budget
- First zero-based budget
- Became stable enough to focus more on economic development and infrastructure projects



S.M.A.R.T. BUDGET (FY 16-17)

- First budget with HSA savings
- Another bond upgrade (A+)
- Fund balance grew to \$15 million
- SMART government structure re-org
- Supported education
- Projected surplus

- Focuses on Government efficiencies

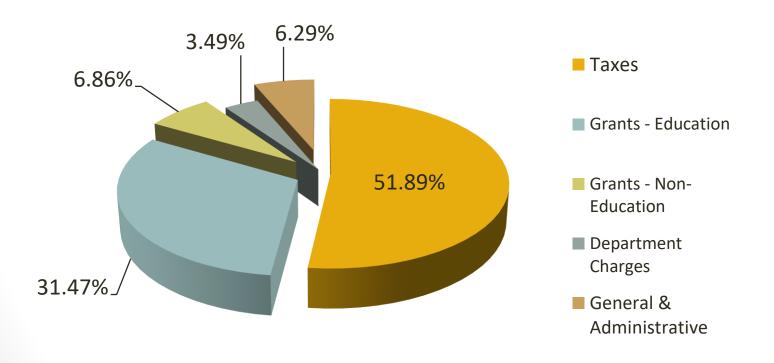

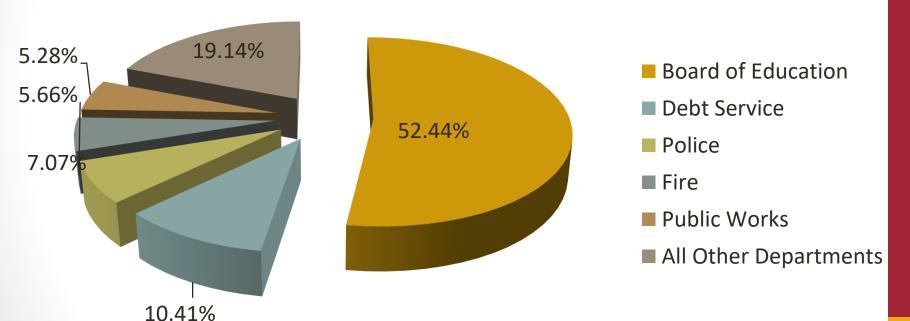
General Fund Revenues

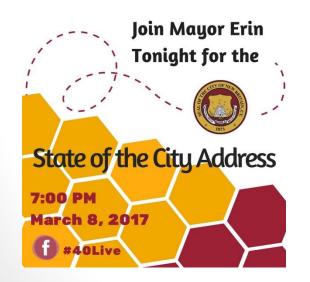

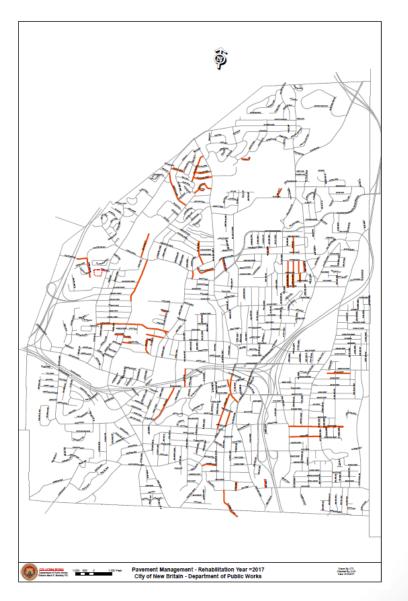

- Doesn't Sell Senior Center and cancel activities

- Doesn't eliminate City Hall staff
- Doesn't Sell entire water department
- Doesn't Sell Stanley golf course
- Doesn't Sell Fairview cemetery

- Council will now have until June to make changes to Mayor's proposal.
- Conditions at the state level continue to drive serious concerns over municipal aid levels going forward
- Budgets are meant to be estimates based on prior year actuals and good faith projections for the coming year
